Blues Choice Awards Recipients Rock the House at Juice Makers

Stephen White Group certainly rocked the house at the Annual Blues Choice Awards where the Blues Society also was celebrating its 17th birthday on Marche 23rd at one of Tulsa's newest live music venues, Juice Maker's Lounge. SWG was voted 2018 Group of the Year by Blues Society members.

Comprised of some of Tulsa's finest musicians, the group's namesake leads the band on vocals and guitar. Stephen has an impressive resume with other bands and notably was guitarist for the late great **Gus Hardin**, not to mention having the genes of his father, Tulsa music legend Don White. Stephen also has a killer guitarist with him in **Travis Fite**. There also is veteran **Dylan Layton** on bass (who fronts his own band, **Whirligig** on guitar); **Matt Martin** may have the record for playing drums for the most bands in town; **Matt Leyland** ably substituted on sax for band member and B3 organist **Robert Day**. Special guest appearances were made by 2018 Vocalist of the Year **Beau Roberson** (Pilgrim) and Rhythm Player of the Year bassist **Steve White** (Steve Pryor, Dustin Pittsley, Dirtbox Wailers). Best Lead of the Year (guitar) award was accepted by **Amber Pittsley**, on behalf of her husband **Dustin Pittsley**, who was on tour in Europe.

Opening the evening's entertainment was a solid performance by past International Blues Challenge semi-finalist Wink Burcham,

accompanied by Dave Morrow on harmonica.

The inaugural **Billy Austin Media Award** was presented to **Bill Martin** by Blues Society President **Christina Rybacki** and Vice President **Amber Pittsley**. It was presented for his many years of service as BST president and editor of the BST's newsletter, Blues News. The name Billy Austin was used as a pen name off and on for decades when Bill was a freelance journalist. He then "named" Billy Austin Editor of the newsletter in the early days of the Blues Society saying if McKinley Morganfield can be Muddy Waters, why can't he be Billy Austin.

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CD Reviews



Tiffany Pollack and Eric Johanson: BLUES IN MY BLOOD

(Nola Blue Records)

Tiffany Pollack is an acclaimed New Orleans Jazz Singer. Eric Johanson is a professional

guitar slinger and former lead guitarist for **Cyril Neville**. They've teamed up to record a new record of originals and covers perfectly showcasing both of their musical talents in the name of the blues. Tiffany sings lead and solo on most of the eleven tracks but Eric also takes the mic and does a fine job. I found Tiffany's vocals too much on the nasal side for my tastes so the tracks that stand out, for me, are the ones Eric sang most on including; No Expectations, Get Lost with Me and If I Had a Hammer. This is a nice, new blues record but doesn't really contain anything new or different that could move me to listen to it again. The songs are pretty much plain as are the performances. Don't take my word for it though. Check out this new album and see if you have a different take on it. Your ears just may love it. - **Curt Fillmore** (CurtsList.Com)



Tommy Castro and the Painkillers:

KILLIN' IT LIVE

(Alligator Records)

This is Tommy's 16th Album, recorded, all over the U.S., due to popular demand, for their

legion of fans throughout the country, because of which, have made Tommy Castro one of the nation's premier blues performers that promotors love to book. This ten track live album features career spanning rockin' blues songs including two covers and eight original songs that Tommy wrote himself. These are the songs Tommy and The Painkillers enjoy playing the most over the last four years that they have been performing together and love to explore and jam to while on stage, much to the country's many audiences loud, joyous approval. Born in California but known for Memphis style blues and R&B; Tommy's vocals and guitar playing have been compared to listening to **Otis Redding** back in 1967. Standouts include Can't Keep A Good Man Down, Lose Lose, Calling San Fransisco, Shakin' The Hard Times Loose, and Them Changes. A live album sure to please any Castro fan, full of great performances from start to finish.

Kenny Parker: HELLFIRE

(Kenny Parker Scribner)

Detroit based Kenny Parker gives us his 3rd album of guitar driven, almost all original blues with special guests **Jim McCarty** and the debut

of **Dan Devins** on vocals and harmonica. It's mostly a rockin' blues album with Kenny handling the lead guitar work, Jim playing rhythm

and lead guitar, and Dan handling the vocal and harp work. Adding bass, drums, and piano/organ to the mix rounds out the sound. I think the performances are all ok and recorded well, but all suffer thanks to the vocals. I hear a lot of albums that, musically, sound excellentif only they had hired a different singer, and this is one of those albums. Check this album out, (I prefer Spotify) and perhaps you will like it. There are 10 studio tracks, a live track, and another live track added as a bonus. Except for those vocals, standouts include Blind and Paralyzed, the Title track, And Then We Danced, and the bonus live track Hard Times. - **Curt Fillmore** (CurtsList.Com)



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Tedeschi Trucks Band: SIGNS

(Fantasy)

Signs is the fourth studio album from Tedeschi Trucks Band and was recorded in Derek & Susan's home studio, Swamp Raga, on two-inch

analogue tape to capture the warm, rich ambience of the best vintage recordings of yesteryear. It contains eleven original blues tracks with that signature Tedeschi Trucks sound of rockin' R&B and slight jazz fusion. This album doesn't seem to rise above the first two tracks but I'm finding that the more I listen to it, the more I like it. Sometimes an album just has to grow on you and might require a few meetings with your ears before it is accepted. The performances are excellent and the vocals are as amazing as expected. The only flaw I've found if one is even needed, to explain the lack of overwelming joy that may have come from listening to their first album, are the songs. They aren't as commercial and catchy and some folks prefer that. With that being said the standout tracks are Signs, High Times, I'm Gonna Be There, Shame, and They Don't Shine. Give this one a little time to win you over and I believe it will. It's a fine new blues album from one of our favorite bands. Great Job! - Curt Fillmore (CurtsList. Com)!

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
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Oklahoma Blues Hall of Fame

Some halls of fame are grandiose affairs - all marble and steel and expensive lighting and walls covered with paintings and rooms full of statues and awards and artifacts related to whatever the hall is celebrating. But the Oklahoma Blues Hall of Fame is none of those things. It is a humble affair, which seems more fitting for something related to the Blues - even something as prestigious as a Hall of Fame. Housed in a gray, former house on the edge of Rentiesville (population 64) in McIntosh County- the hall pays homage to some of the greats in the Blues genre, musicians who have contributed a lot to the Blues but perhaps were overlooked by other halls of fame. The house sits on the old family farm (which in the '50s sometimes was noted for being a corn whiskey house).

DC Minner was raised there by his grandmother until he was bitten by the Blues bug and traveled the nation playing first as a bass player for greats like Freddie King, OV Wright, Chuck Berry and Bo Diddley, later fronting his own band on guitar with wife Selby, an accomplished bassist. Minner and his wife returned to Rentiesville and brought a wealth of music with them. The couple reopened his Grandmother Lura's Cozy Corner as the Down Home Blues Club in 1988, and started the Dusk til Dawn Blues Festival in 1991. This soon required turning the five-acre farm into a music venue, filling in the farm pond and building a fence and two stages as the Festival moved outdoors and to three nights and three stages.

In 2004 the couple launched the Oklahoma Blues Hall of Fame, headquartered inside the Blues club. More than 70 musicians have been inducted, their pictures hanging on walls inside the club. More pictures will be added to the walls this year at the induction celebration. The couple started the Hall of Fame four years before Minner died in 2008 at the age of 73. He was inducted in 2010. Minner was inducted into other halls of fame as well. In 1998 he was inducted into the Oklahoma Jazz Hall of Fame, and in 2003 to the Oklahoma Music Hall of fame. The popular musician said the reason he wanted to start the Hall of Fame was because: "this induction into the Jazz Hall of Fame has changed my life. I now feel that my grandmother has been validated, even though she raised me in a corn whiskey house, and that my commitment to the music will be remembered and make a difference into the future. We need to start a hall of fame here. We have a place to do it, and the larger halls of fame are going to miss some of these blues people. They have their hands full, but we know the blues community. We have worked with or hired so many of them with the festival and all. We need to induct them while they are still alive." So he began to work to share the spotlight,' and to 'give credit where credit is due.'

HOW INDUCTEES ARE SELECTED

Several non profits and blues scholars bring in nominations. The Oklahoma Blues Society in Oklahoma City, the Blues Society of Tulsa, Frank Swain, Kerry Kudlacek, Dr. Hugh Foley, and other inductees have all nominated candidates. To be considered an artist must be born in or have resided in Oklahoma or have a strong blues related relationship to Oklahoma. Important qualities to

consider include:

- Keeping the music alive through demonstrated excellence in performance and/or songwriting
- A long term commitment to preserving and supporting blues music in Oklahoma.
- Support and continuation of the Blues tradition though education or sharing the music.
- Have been alive long enough to be close to retirement age or other extenuating circumstances (illness etc.).

THE INDUCTEES of Oklahoma Blues Hall of Fame 2019:

Kelvin "Mr. Guitar" Drake of OKC

Wonda "Sunsetter" Macon – a lifetime of singing the blues from the OKC metro area.

Pat "Bar Room Preacher" Moss works regularly in the Clarksdale area, deep roots blues grooves.

Tank Jernigan does the flute intro solo on one of the biggest hits from the tune Goin' To The Country. He is also a horn arranger at Capitol Records I Hollywood, including working on horn parts for Ray Charles' recordings there. He toured non stop with Larry Johnson's New Breed out of OKC

Shy Willie Mabry of Muskogee. He lived many years in Chicago and performed with Muddy Waters.

Michael "Magic Mike" Updegrove, OKC area, toured with his band across the US opening. Also in Miss Blues' Band

Lauree Watkins, tenor sax, a fixture in the San Francisco area who played there in the 70s, 80, 90s, particularly North Beach. In the short at the beginning of Don Johnson's TV series set in San Francisco.

Smilin' Vic Gutierrez of the Soul Monkeys, great drummer, also smooth vocals.

Morris Atchison of Eufaula OK, sax, toured with Bobby Blue Bland many years and also D.C. Minner Selby and Blues on the Move.

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
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
