MARK CARPENTER:

"All the Music is about Healing" By Bill Martin

Tulsa guitarist, singer-songwriter **Mark Carpenter** knows time is slipping away and these days just can't write songs fast enough. Mark, 61, wishes he had done this 30 years ago. Yet, one can sense his

excitement in the wake of his album 2Shakerz, released in 2017.

He began playing guitar at age 10. By junior high Mark and his best friend and future *Oklahoma Blues Hall of Famer* **Steve Pryor** were learning to play guitar. Steve was taking lessons from Tulsa icon **Mike (Monk) Bruce**, then Mark would get free lessons from Steve. But it was seeing **Jimi Hendrix** in concert three months before Hendrix's death in 1970 that was "life changing."

The class of 1974 at Nathan Hale High School produced four exceptional musicians. This is

where Mark formed *Light Year* with Pryor, guitar/vocals; and other classmates **Damon Daniel**, drums; and Mark's cousin, **Jim Strader**.

Among other bands during the '70s he was with **Steve Munson** in the group, *Big Frank*, as well as *Randy Crouch and the Flyin' Horse Opera*. By 1980, drummer **Jamie Oldaker** came off the **Eric Clapton** tour and gathered Carpenter, Strader and Pryor to form the band *The Shakerz*. There also was **Pat Murray** on keyboards and **Dick Sims (Eric Clapton's B3** organ player) as well as other well-known musicians like **Pat "Taco" Ryan** on sax, **Jimmy Karstein**, **David M. Teegarden**, **Sr**, **Chuck Dewalt**, **Billy Estes**, and cousins **Mike** and **Jerry Naifeh** who were drummers filling in for Oldaker when he was on the road. Mark Carpenter and Jamie Oldaker:

2SHAKERZ

Here is what is great about **Mark Carpenter**'s 2Shakers album. Everything.



More specifically, *Great songwriting*: There are 10 originals and each song is as solid as your grandmother's faith in **Jesus**. *Great lyrics*: Unlike so many 12-bar feeling sorry for yourself blues tunes, Mark takes ownership of bad decisions in life, but so eloquently puts it into words. *Great vocals*: The first time I heard Mark sing, it gave me goosebumps not unlike the first time I heard **Jim Morrison**. There is a purity and vulnerability in the vocals. *Great guitar*: You are in junior high and your best friend is **Steve Pryor**, and both of you have unending talent, teaching and learning from one another.

Beyond the Stars is a wonderful, touching tune Mark wrote about his cousin, Tulsa iconic bass man **Jim Strader**, who died in 2009. With the passing of Pryor in 2016, it also now is about him. Mark sings, "Can you hear me up in the promise land?" He reminisces about things he'd wish he'd said and "...feeling your spirit when I pray....Every time I pick up this old guitar, I know someday I'll be with you in a band beyond the stars"

Mark handles all the vocals, guitar and bass, with **Jamie Oldaker** (**Eric Clapton**) on drums.

The bad news is after 15 months, one album and a couple of gigs, Mark has moved on from *2Shakerz*. The good news is he has hundreds of hooks for potential songs and enough material ready for four albums. — **Bill Martin**

In 1983 **Gus Hardin** was named *Top Female New Country Artist*. Carpenter was hired for her tour opening for **Alabama** and **Hank Williams**, **Jr.** When the tour ended in Los Angeles, Mark decided to move there and began working in the music and film industry for the next 8 years. He worked on movie soundtracks with **Dennis Dreith**. During this period Carpenter also played in local area bands with **Andy Doerschuk**, **Darrell Leonard**, **Gary Richwine**, **James Hutch Hutchison** (**Bonnie Raitt**) and **Marty Grebb**. He also worked in the studio with **Craig T. Fall**, infamous guitarist for **Glen Campbell**.

In 1991 he moved back to Tulsa, played in various bands including *The Kings*, which competed in the International Blues Challenge in Memphis.

He also played with **Windy Austin & the Hot House Tomato Boys**. However, the next 12 years would prove to be a continuously challenging time in Carpenter's life, as substances became a solid detour. After driving off a Rocky Mountain cliff in 1999 and the agonizing spiral towards the bottom in 2008, he began treatment in Tulsa and then moved to Joplin, MO for continued recovery. He formed a band with fellow housemates called the *Velvet Poker Dogs* and recorded an album of high intensity rock and roll original songs that is uploaded to myspace.com. Mark moved back to Tulsa in 2009 to be with his family.

In 2010 he met underground musician, producer, and engineer **Steve Thornbrugh**. It was an immediate brotherhood bond, and the songwriting and creativity exploded! Also in this tight brotherhood is mastering engineer **Seth Bove** of New York. The three worked and collaborated on songs together for the past 7 years as a solid team. Carpenter has 4 LP's of material in the works from all genre's imaginable.

In the spring of 2016, Carpenter and Oldaker's lives crossed paths again at Steve Pryor's heartbreaking funeral. A month later they met again, playing a memorial/tribute concert for Pryor at Cain's Ballroom. Carpenter asked Oldaker if he would be interested in playing on a few of his songs. Oldaker agreed and put drum tracks on the 10 song LP.

In November 2016 Oldaker and Carpenter formed the *2Shakerz*. In September of 2017 after 15 months, 2 gigs and 5 rehearsals, Carpenter decided to end the *2Shakerz* and focus on sending his original material to Los Angeles. He is recording an acoustic EP, and a rock n' roll blues EP of new original songs with Thornbrugh, and working with **Pride Hutchison** of *Explosive Records* in Tulsa. Speaking of his songs recently, he said, "All the music is about healing.."

Carpenter cannot give enough praise for the album's producer, **Steve Thornburg**, as well as **Seth Bove** who mastered it, plus **Larry Shaeffer** for providing the vintage amplifiers.

Carpenter focuses the energy of his music around the concepts of recovery, healing, truth and compassion-healing the soul, the Earth, and ourselves. Awareness of the atrocities happening worldwide, his music is an exploration in love and survival from **Miles Davis** to **Jerry Garcia**, and a spiritual adventure in karma from **Jimi Hendrix** to the truthful brilliance of **Chris Cornell**.

Billy's Blues

Music Soothes the Soul Until that Great Gig in the Sky

What started out in February 2002, 16 years ago, as a handful of music lovers (that didn't include me), turned out to be something quite special.

I would become part of this small group (see founding members on page 2) within a few months, around the same time as BST

member **Freddie Morrow**. In February 2003 I was elected the Blues Society's second president.

It has been a long and winding road leading to many new friends, including getting to personally know many of the fine musicians in Tulsa and across the country.

For a guy who can't carry a tune, much less sustain a note on a Stratocaster, being a part of this family of artists helped fulfill a need. My love of music has always been there from the hymnals growing up in church, to buying my first blues record, a used 78 rpm in the record bin for 33 cents at a North Tulsa grocery store. I was 12 years old when I forked out the change for *Leave My Little Kitten Alone* by **Little Willie John**. I had recently got a small blue turntable for Christmas.

Pardon the reflections as the Blues Society turns 16 years old and I complete my 15th year as your president.

It was November 2002 the first issue of the *Blues News* was published. It started out as a monthly newsletter with four pages, but soon expanded to six pages, then eight and occasionally 12 pages. In October 2003 it was changed to a bi-monthly, mostly to reduce publishing costs.

This is the 98th issue of the *Blues News* ever published. My alter ego **Billy Austin** has been its editor since day one. It also is Billy Austin's last *Blues News*. He has no regrets and simply knows it is time to move on.

A key to the Blues Society's early success was the Oklahoma Blues Festival which had been around several years when the BST was formed. Having a booth to sell merchandise and recruit new members helped make us financially solvent and gave us creditability. During this time we grew to 400 members, although the fun atmosphere and buzz of Budweiser no doubt contributed to fewer new members renewing their annual memberships.

With the last Oklahoma Blues festival in 2006, we had to work much harder to raise money by attending more, but much smaller events. While in more recent years we've had about 250 loyal members, those music lovers tend to stick with us and appreciate our goal of supporting the blues, local artists and live music.

Perhaps my proudest moment with the Blues Society came at the 2009 International Blues Challenge when Tulsa's **Little Joe** won the solo/duo competition where 64 acts from around the world had entered.

I was also very proud in 2010 when the **Dustin Pittsley Band** was crowned *Kings of Beale Street*. This competition involved 10 bands that didn't make the IBC finals, who were chosen by 10 Beale Street club owners. Ironically the competition was held at the *New Daisy Theatre* on the East end of Beale Street at the same time the IBC finals were being held at the *Orpheum Theatre* on the West end of Beale Street.

Needless to say, the *Kings of Beale Street* competition "mysteriously" disappeared after one year. Perhaps social media played a part as word quickly spread and a number of people left the Orpheum for the New Daisy that evening...

These two highlights of my presidency represent bedrocks of one of my goals the past 15 years. That is for the world of blues to be more inclusive. **Little Joe** is as traditional as they come with his Piedmont style blues. **Dustin Pittsley's** blues rock is at the other end of the spectrum. I see both as exceptional artists in the blues genre.

There no longer is a **Son House**, or **Muddy Waters**, much less a **Stevie Ray Vaughn**. So where does the blues go from here? Nowhere, if many of the hardcore traditionalists have their way. This was disgustingly displayed at the 2012 *Blues Music Awards* in Memphis when **Joe Bonamassa's** *Dust Bowl* won the *Rock Blues Award*. Some in the crowd actually booed him when the award was announced.

But like it or not, the traditional blues artists are not drawing the crowds. Bonamassa, age 40, is selling out mid-sized venues for as much as \$100 a pop. How many other artists in the blues genre are doing this?

Over the years I've addressed this issue, and felt I had to do it one more time.

In closing, I am so proud of the *Blues Society of Tulsa* and its members and officers, who make it what it is. The BST is one of 200 worldwide affiliates of the *Blues Foundation*. We also are one of the largest and most active of these affiliates with numerous programs and events to support the artists and their music.

There are too many people to thank, but I've done this in the past. So I'm limiting my thanks to my beautiful wife of 49 years Vivian. Without her, our Blues Society would not be where it is today. She is my rock, best friend. confidante and supporter.

What an exceptional journey! It is music that soothes the soul until that great gig in the sky. – **Bill Martin**

All of the BCA winners have been invited to perform at the event set for Saturday, March 24th, at Soul City. Members of the James Groves Band are: James Groves, guitar/vocals; Stephen White – guitar/ vocals; Matt Martin, bass, Gary Eldridge, harmonica and David Teegarden Jr., drums.

James and his band won the 2013 Tulsa Blues Challenge and in 2011 he won the solo/duo competition, both earning him trips to compete in the International Blues Challenge in Memphis. James,

41, has been playing guitar since he was about 12 years old and has played in several bands. The James Groves Blues Machine was his first band and has recently changed its name to The James Groves Band. James' major musical influences are Eric Clapton, Stevie Ray Vaughn, B.B. King, Freddie King and Albert King as well as Buddy Guy and Albert Collins.



Dylan Whitney

Dylan Whitney started playing a ukulele when he one-year-old and about a decade later got his first guitar. He has always excelled in academics and during his junior year at Charles Page High School he won the All State Guitarist competition. Dylan, age 20, is now a junior at Northeastern State University, majoring in accounting. The band consists of: Dylan Whitney, lead guitar, harmonica; Michael Mcloure, rhythm guitar, Chris Matthews, drums; Chelsea Gann, vocals; and Wes Atkinson, bass.

Dylan cites among his major musical influences: J.J. Cale, Eric Clapton, B.B. King, Stevie Ray Vaughn, Los Lonely Boys and Lincoln Brewster. In the past he has had special praise for local Tulsa musicians, including James Groves, who was the first artist to invite him on stage to play. (Continued on page 6)

to ever come out of Tulsa and that's
saying a lot. He kicked open the door for
Tulsa musicians in the record business.
As a teen, he was playing with Jerry Lee
Lewis and the Everly Brothers. He was
the drummer on ABC's "Shindig" music

show. He recorded with Joe Cocker, Freddy King, Jimi Hendrix, Taj Mahal, and many more. He was Leon Russell's favorite drummer. He was a natural. RIP.

Best Vocalist: Stephen White not only will be honored as a
member of the James Groves Band, but will be recognized as Best
Vocalist for 2017. Stephen was born and raised in Tulsa, played
with Gus Hardin and many others, before fronting Steve White
and Supergroove 1999-2004. He lived in Dallas from 2006 – 2016



before returning to his hometown. He also is a super guitarist and now has the **Stephen White Band**. Additionally, Stephen shares a Wednesday night gig at Soul City with his dad, Tulsa legendary musician, **Don White**.

BEST LEAD: Blues rock maestro **Dustin Pittsley** (**photo**) takes home his 9th Best Lead award for

his guitar prowess. He's also been named *Best Vocalist* three times. Additionally, the **Dustin Pittsley Band** has been voted *Best Group* 11 times, touring the Midwest, including multiple shows *at Buddy Guys Legends*.



BEST RHYTHM: Chris Kyle (photo) perhaps is best known as the keyboardist extraordinaire for the **Dustin Pittsley Band**, although he also fronts his own improv, funk, fusion instrumental band, **Ego Culture**, plus plays keys for the rock/blues group, **American Shadows**



CD REVIEWS



Pete Marriott and Jennifer Marriott: DIGGING UP MY ROOTS (Marpo Music)

Pete and Jennifer Marriott have been thrilling music lovers in Tulsa and the surrounding area for years. From Tulsa, Pete is a veteran, amazing guitar

slinging, road dog - touring and performing all over the world with **Joe Cocker**, **Richie Havens**, **Ronnie Dunn** and others. Jennifer started performing at a jam night in Ontario Canada in 1989 and quickly became their star. She's known for her smokey vocals that can enchant anyone from a whisper to a growl with some fine guitar skills as well.

I'm guessing she and Pete probably performed together and eventually decided to team up and the rest has benefited Tulsa's awesome music history. Here's their third album of 17 original rockin' blues tracks. Stand outs include *Got Life*, *Change of Heart*, *I Want You So Badly*, *How Can I Say Goodbye*, and *Left Me the Blues*. This is an outstanding collection of songs and performances not only from Pete and Jen, but from the musicians that joined each session. Bravo! Excellent album! The Disparrows: WASTING TIME

The Disparrows are an American based rock band that create, produce, and manage their own music. *Wasting Time* is album number three of all original music for this band comprised of three main

members; **Daniel Weber** on guitar/vox, **Stephen Tecci** on bass/vox, and **Grant Loosevelt** on piano/vox. This new album features a big guitar driven sound with plenty of piano. I'm pretty sure **Journey** had to have been an inspiration from the sounds and style of their compositions. Stand out tracks are *Believe in Me*, *Set Me Free*, *May Be Crazy*, and *Radio*. Johnny Oskam: IN MY SHADOW

Here's some hard hitting, guitar driven, rockin' blues from a young band that's surprising critics and veteran blues stars alike for not only their youth, but intense and amazing performances

that belie their age. You can definitely hear **Hendrix**, **Zeppelin**, **Soundgarden**, and **Stevie Ray** in their sound and swagger with a lot of killer guitar performances throughout. This is Johnny's second album of all original music and I'd have to say a grand listening adventure of outstanding blues/rock music. Stand out tracks include *Badlands*, *Turn the Key*, *Waiting for the Rain*, *Drag You Down*, and *Limbo Lane*.

Karen Lovely: FISH OUTTA WATER

Lucinda Williams immediately comes to mind listening to the first of these 12 tracks, an all original collection. This is album number five for American electric blues **singer Karen Lovely**. She

follows the long standing blues tradition of sticking to current issues including social injustice, abuse, and homelessness with lyrics that grab your heart and music that moves your body. There's also a **K.D.** Lang element to these recordings the listener may notice as well.

This is electric and country blues all sweetly mixed together. Stand out tracks include the title track, *Waking Up The Dead, Everything Means Nothing, Next Time, Hades' Bride (There Was a Time)* and *Nice and Easy.*

There are subtle yet mesmerizing performances from everyone involved. Very Nice! A Definite Winner! Outstanding Vocals! - Curt Fillmore (CurtsList.Com)




Annual BST Officer Elections are Scheduled for February 12th


